## Third In Succession

It's beginning to look a lot like Sisler Spartans of the Winnipeg High School Football League have a monopoly on the Harry Hood Memorial Trophy.

For the third year running, a member of the Spartans has won the award, which goes to the player in Grade 12 who maintains the highest standard of playing ability, sportsmanship, and scholastic achievement.

This year's recipient of the award went to offensive end Mike Kashty. Kashty has some fine company dating back two years when Sisler's Gary Bohonas won it in 1970 and Barry Melnyk last year.

"I was really surprised when I heard I had won it," said Kashty, "but most of the credit goes to my coaches Mr. Frank Bryan, Mr. Larry Marquardson and Mr. J. M. Fieldy."

He also named his brother Myron; halfback Gary Rosolowich; defensive linemen Ted Lukasiewicz; and Doug Traflic; and quarterback Rick Koswin as contributing factors to his success.

"Rosolowich is the best player in high school football and Koswin is the best quarterback," he said. "They all deserved to win it."

Kashty's contribution to the club was one of the main reasons they went that far. His 32 points on five touchdowns and two converts placed him 13th in the scoring race.

He went both ways on the squad and was called in to take over at the halfback spot in the team's third game when superstar Rosolowich broke his collar bone. It was there the underrated number 76 shone his brightest. Moving from his end position, Kashty looked as though he was born as a halfback giving Sisler the backup strength it thought it had lost due to Rosolowich's injury.

"Next year I hope to go into Law or Architecture at University of Manitoba, but I really haven't made any final decisions as yet," he said. "As for football, I'll probably try out for the Bisons, but if I have to sit on the bench I may just play junior ball with Winnipeg Hawkeyes. It also depends on how much time football takes away from my studies. My education comes, first," he said.

Scholastically, Kashty is presently maintaining an 84 per cent average in all his Grade 12 subjects. He has passed with honors in each of his years at Sisler.
